Fall color can be a reminder that we need to care for our trees before winter arrives. Prepare trees by giving them enough water, check the limbs for damage, check the mulch, or plant new trees.

Water: Pay attention if we are experiencing drought-like conditions. If rain is scarce, trees could use a 5 gallon weekly watering. Evergreen trees are most vulnerable because water loss in the needles during freezing temperatures can be detrimental. So frequently watering evergreen trees throughout fall until the ground freezes is beneficial. The easiest way to water all trees is a weekly deep root slow soaking in the absence of rain.

Tree Inspection: Prune or remove limbs that are diseased, dead, broken, or could be dangerous with upcoming winds, ice or snow. Protecting young or vulnerable tree trunks with appropriate guards can ward off winter animal damage or sunscald.

Mulch: Fluff up the existing mulch, or add a 3-4 inch layer of mulch keeping it away from the base of the trunk. This naturally helps retain soil moisture and insulates the roots from swings in temperature.

Plant: September through early November are great months to plant trees and shrubs. It's best to plan for the tree to be in place for 6 weeks before the first frost when the soil temperature is at least 55 degrees at a 6-inch depth upon planting. Because trees build root systems during the winter, make sure your newly planted trees are watered and mulched per the aforementioned details.

State Approves New KLC License Plate



The Kentucky League of Cities announced earlier today at its 2025 Conference & Expo that the Kentucky Division of Motor Vehicles has officially approved a new cities license plate. All proceeds from the plate will go to the [KLC Cities Helping Cities](#) program, which helps Kentucky cities in times of disasters or emergencies.

FALL LEAVES AND CITY STREETS: A *Friendly Reminder*

With fall settling in, the leaves are starting to drop—and they'll keep coming. Every year, news stories pop up about the benefits of leaving leaves where they fall. While that might work in wooded areas or private gardens, it doesn't work in a city setting.

Here, leaves that aren't raked or mulched end up clogging storm drains and ditches. When water can't flow properly, it backs up, freezes, and damages sidewalks and streets. It also creates slick spots on the road that can be dangerous for drivers and pedestrians. Clearing leaves helps protect our infrastructure and keeps things safer for everyone.

We also know that not all the leaves in your yard come from your own trees. Wind doesn't care about property lines, and it's not always fair. Leaves from neighboring trees often blow across yards and settle in places where they cause problems. Some trees even hold onto their leaves well into winter—sometimes almost to spring. We ask that residents do what they can, especially keeping an eye on storm grates and roadside ditches.

Fall is also a good time to trim back low-hanging limbs and brush. The standard clearance is 12 to 14 feet above streets and 8 feet above sidewalks. Brush and branches should be cut back a few feet from the street and at least one foot from the sidewalk.

If we get freezing rain—as we have in recent years—low-hanging limbs can become heavy with ice and block traffic or make sidewalks unsafe. Trimming now helps prevent those issues later.

Let's all be good neighbors! A little effort now goes a long way toward keeping our streets clean, safe, and walkable through the winter months.

Tips for attending a Pop-Up Drop-Off:

Pop-Up Drop-Off events are extremely popular, and our staff strives to make the drive-through experience as efficient as possible. Here are seven tips for attending a Pop-Up Drop-Off:

- 1) Do not arrive early! All Pop-Up Drop-Off events start at 10am. A line of vehicles causes traffic backups and prevents our equipment from entering.
- 2) Only bring sensitive documents to be shredded! The line for shredding is usually the longest. We have seen catalogs, paperback books, etc. being shredded, which is unnecessary and takes up valuable time.
- 3) Make sure no items are mixed with your documents! We've seen hammers, scissors, and toys mixed in with documents. These contaminants can break the shredding truck's equipment!
- 4) Try giving away usable items first! We see a LOT of decent items being trashed or recycled at our events. Some residents even offer these items to workers - staff is not allowed to keep items. Please try to donate or give away BEFORE coming to our waste and recycling event.
- 5) Loads of construction materials, lumber, and loose debris are NOT allowed! Take these loads to the Waste Reduction Center at 636 Meriwether Ave instead. Pop-Up Drop-Off events are very popular - please follow the rules so we can keep the line moving.
- 6) Separate your loads into the various categories! More can be recycled, and the line moves faster when you are ready to offload your items at each station.

Check-in staff will ask for your zip code and which types of items you brought. We track this information so we can keep improving our events. Most residents bring large items, electronics, and documents for shredding. Other categories include metal (or mostly metal) items, tires, yard waste, household recyclables, prescription medication, and shoes.


